Shopping List

W.E.A.V.E. (Women Escaping a Violent Environment):

A very special organization in our community that has been helping women and children in need for over 30 years.

The Storehouse:

Their mission is to serve people in Custer County by receiving and distributing with respect and compassion donated food and household items.

Pine Ridge Diaper Drive:

Diapers are as essential to a child's basic needs as food and shelter—yet state and federal programs do not offer special funding for those in need.

Humane Society—Custer:

- → Dry dog food: Purina, or other name brand,

Wasn't it wonderful to have so many spring-like days during February? I wonder it this happens to anyone else, that when we have days that feel like Spring is here, that Spring just might be here? The truth is, however, not yet. You are receiving this newsletter at the beginning of March, with lots of announcements about Easter. Unless you are reading this on March 31st, we still have a few more weeks of Lent, it's not Easter yet.



And yet...we know that Jesus has already been raised from the dead, that the cross and the tomb are empty! So why Lent? Why Holy Week? Why do we retell the story of Jesus' death and not just skip to retelling the story of the Resurrection?

For the last several weeks we have been reading from Mark's Gospel. In the first chapter, Jesus tells the people "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." (Mark 1:15). It is still true today, the Kingdom of God has come near. But it is not fully here, not yet. The work of conquering death on the cross has been accomplished, but there is still despair and sin in this world. Until God has accomplished what God sent Jesus to do, and through the power of the Holy Spirit has empowered the Body of Christ to accomplish, then God still has work to do.

This is such mysterious and sometimes confusing theology, this idea of already and not yet. It is also very beautiful to think that because of Christ's death, because of his Resurrection, there is still hope for us. If it was done and over and there was still so much suffering and oppression, and injustice in the world, it would be a pretty sad and maybe even hopeless feeling. The Good News is that Christ is still at work in us, in the world, in the Cosmos!

During these last few weeks of Lent we get the opportunity to live in this tension. We are still human with mortal bodies, hard work to do, and no way to know what will come next in our own lives or the life of the church. But we come to strip away our ego and our arrogance and our sinful nature that tries to tell God what to do. And we wait. We wait to sing Alleluia. We wait to bring Wednesday Worship back into the Sanctuary. We wait and we remember all that Jesus has done and is still doing on our behalf. We trust that the Kingdom of God is here, but we are not fully there, not yet. And yet, we believe that on that Glorious day, when we are all gathered around the Heavenly banquet, we will indeed be surrounded by the Glory of God! We will then finally understand the words Paul wrote, "For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his." (Romans 6:5)

PARISH NURSE

Parish Nurse News/March 2024

March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month. Colorectal cancer is the 2nd leading cause of death but it also is preventable thanks to screening. Screening can find signs of colon or rectal cancer letting doctors take action to prevent disease.

Screening can find colorectal cancer early when treatment is most effective. There are two types of screening options. You should discuss options with your doctor. One is stool based where you have a sample of your stool sent to a lab for testing. If it is positive you will need to undergo a colonoscopy. The second option is a colonoscopy, where your rectum and colon can be visualized through a scope for any evidence of potential cancer. A sample can be taken for testing through this scope. With the colonoscopy there is a prep done with the intention of cleaning out your bowels before the procedure. The prep can be unpleasant but benefits outweigh the discomfort. During the actual procedure you will be under anesthesia and monitored.

Who should be tested? Adults from age 45-75, sooner if there is family history. You can also go beyond 75 if your doctor recommends it.

Risk factors include having certain polyps (growths), family history, smoking, obesity, sedentary lifestyle, drinking too much alcohol and inflammatory bowel disease or chronic problems with small intestine and colon. Unfortunately many people ignore warning signs or routine screening. Waiting too long can be deadly.

MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS

This month I am going to discuss Substance Abuse Disorders and especially how they can interact with Mental Illness. Repeated misuse of alcohol and/or drugs often occur simultaneously in individuals with mental illness, usually to cope with overwhelming symptoms. This combination has its own term, "dual diagnosis" or co-occurring disorders. Either one can develop first. This disorder affects over 17 million adults in the US.

Symptoms vary widely. A person withdraws from family & friends, sudden changes in behavior, engaging in risky behaviors, developing a high tolerance and withdrawal symptoms, and feeling like you need a drug in order to function.

Best treatment involves an integrated intervention where the person receives treatment for their mental illness and substance abuse disorder. First the person needs to go through a monitored withdrawal of the substance, usually done on an inpatient basis. This can take up to 7 days. Then Inpatient Rehabilitation is started in a treatment facility. They provide therapy, supportive medication if needed, and health services. Psychotherapy plays a large part in an effective treatment plan. Cognitive Therapy is also often included in treatment to help learn how to cope and change ineffective patterns of thinking. After this they may enter into supportive housing like a group home or sober house. Once out of treatment it is recommended to get involved in a self-help or support group. This can be a challenging and isolating time. In these kinds of groups you can feel safe to share frustrations, celebrate successes, find referrals, community resources and swap recovery ideas. Several of these groups are "Double Trouble in Recovery", AA or NA. We have local groups in our area.
